# A Full House: DePaul Cristo Rey's Challenges in Its Seventh Year



When the first bell rang on Thursday, August 17, it signaled the start of a new school year at DePaul Cristo Rey, just the seventh in the school's history, and carried with it the anticipation of all the academic, professional and social growth that's ahead.

Starting school that day were 110 new students, continuing the trend of full freshman classes and increasing interest among transfer students. Those new students were warmly welcomed, but they put a face to the challenge that continues to plague school leaders – how to continue serving students on an outdated campus that is at capacity.

DePaul Cristo Rey's original buildings were built for elementary and preschool students, which raised the followed questions:

- How to feed 340 high school students in a cafeteria designed for 60 small children?
- How to optimize learning in classrooms sized for 20 small bodies?

- How to keep students safe crossing a parking lot and moving among five buildings with a combined 18 doors?
- How to manage competitions, crowds and safety at high school athletic events played in a grade school sized gymnasium?
- How to best address the very real day-to-day needs of our students for meals, clean clothes, and physical and mental health care that have a huge impact on their education?
- How to best continue supporting our graduates when they move from this campus to the wider world of college?

School leaders, board members and outside experts have grappled with these questions since the school opened in 2011 and more intensively in the past two years. Their questions, research and ideas have led to the development of a campus master plan that addresses these very real barriers to enrollment growth. It also focuses on how to make space for staff and resources that support DPCR students' complex, diverse needs with services not typically found in traditional high schools.

# A Letter From the President

### Dear Friends of DePaul Cristo Rey,

Believe it or not, I'm one of those people who spends too much time sitting at a computer. But that seat feels more

like a three-legged stool, not a desk chair. That stool has legs in the past, the present and the future. I am in daily conversations with people about our school, its mission, its history, and most importantly, its students. I tell and retell the founding story of both the Cristo Rey Network and DePaul Cristo Rey in particular. Thus I always seem to have one foot in the past.

Any one of these problems would have undermined her strong start in college; collectively they were proving to be a nightmare for her!

The third foot of my stool is always firmly planted in the future. From the day the Sisters of Charity launched this school, I have also stayed focused on next year, the next five years, the next 20 years. How will we support this growing school? Who will partner with our Corporate Work Study Program? Where will our students come from and what will they need when they arrive? Who will share their resources with us? How will this school grow to meet emerging needs and enrollment? Who will help to lead it?

Our cover story focuses on how we are shaping our future, creating a campus master plan while also recognizing and enhancing the resources needed to keep students in school through college. Advancing our mission is the work of many, many people – board members and volunteers who bring their wisdom and experience; staff and students who contribute their hopes; architects, engineers and contractors who are helping us figure out how to make the best use of our resources; and donors whose generosity is turning our plans into reality.


# **Sixth Annual Golf Classic is Best Yet**

Jasmine Luna Villa graduated from DePaul Cristo Rey in 2016. Now a sophomore fine arts major at **Mount** St. Joseph University, she shares what she's been doing since graduation.

"When I started at DePaul Cristo Rey, I really hadn't given too much thought about what my future would look like. Watching DPCR's first graduating class collectively get accepted to college, and experiencing their excitement, was inspiring. I decided I wanted to follow their example and be a student who goes to college. My parents moved to the United States and sacrificed so much so my brothers and I could have a better life and a different future. DPCR inspired me and prepared me to go after the life I want. I remember my first day at the Mount; I knew what to expect and the steps I needed to take in order to succeed.

This past summer I participated in the Mount's Summer Employment Program which is similar to DPCR's Corporate Work Study Program. I worked at Su Casa Hispanic Center helping pre-k to second grade Hispanic children improve their English, Spanish and math. I also had a marketing role promoting programs, creating event flyers and engaging with parents. I walked away from that experience thinking I might want to be an art teacher.

I use what I learned at DPCR in my studies and employment; it has helped me feel more confident. I know that I will have those lessons to apply through the rest of my schooling, career and life in general."

# **Meet Our New Principal Chris Wilke**



A new era is underway at DePaul Cristo Rey with **Christopher Wilke** now leading the academic program as the school's second principal. Chris is no stranger to the DPCR community having joined the faculty in 2013 as a social studies teacher and serving the past year as co-director of the Corporate Work Study Program. A graduate of the University of Dayton, he holds a master's degree in educational administration from Xavier University and spent 15 years as a teacher and administrator in Greater Cincinnati Catholic schools prior to teaching at DPCR. Here he shares his vision, plans and hopes for DPCR and our students.

# What is your vision for the academic program as DPCR progresses from a new to a mature school?

For students, my goal is to strengthen their college readiness by focusing on research based writing, ACT test preparation, and developing within them a sense of questioning and inquiry, as well as critical thinking skills. For faculty, I am focused on enhancing cooperative teaching strategies, critical thinking and inquiry strategies, and developing a comprehensive coaching and mentoring framework so teachers can best serve the needs of our students.

#### How do you plan to engage and support parents in their critical role in their students' success?

First I want to find out what our parents want from the school in terms of ongoing education for them as the parents and guardians of college-bound students. Then I hope to re-engage families through monthly evening opportunities that address the issues that they have told us are of greatest concern or practical need to support their students as they transition to college.

# Why are you giving renewed focus to the guidance and college counselors at DPCR?

The guidance counselors are the main resources students have to achieve their acceptance into college through the college exploration and application process. We have invested in our counseling department so it is fully staffed and equipped to ensure our students are getting into the colleges they want and receiving the scholarship money they need. We have also invested in a full-time counselor to support our alumni in college with the addition of our Director of Graduate Success Larisa Wright. In addition, our partnership with Beech Acres has proven so incredibly valuable as their social workers help our students through personal, social and emotional challenges so they can stay focused on academics and college preparation.

#### Why did you want to lead DPCR as principal?

I admire the courage and strength of our students, and they inspire me in so many ways. I want to help them have the best high school experience they can and to leave here stronger than when they started. I believe the way to best serve our students is to give full attention to our teachers. I'm incredibly excited to work with our teachers through professional development and ongoing training, while supporting and challenging them to improve so that they are fully equipped to push their students to be those critical thinkers who have the strength and capacity to keep persisting when it gets tough.

# "Welcome Home!" Reflections from Nazareth Farm



After riding five hours on windy roads, mountains and highways, four students (Josmary '18, Alejandra '18, Ian '19, and Sakura '19), Spanish teacher Michael Delaney, and I hopped out of the school van to be greeted by the Nazareth Farm staff. We were welcomed with hugs and the greeting, "Welcome home!" as if we were long-lost family members. We quickly learned all about Nazareth Farm and its four cornerstones: simplicity, community, prayer, and service. These cornerstones came with their own challenges as we spent a week in service at this Catholic community in rural West Virginia.

Nazareth Farm is committed to living out the themes of Catholic Social Teaching, so they challenge their volunteers to also live them especially by being environmentally conscious through composting, taking bucket showers, working in the garden, using an outhouse, turning off the lights, and being mindful of water use.

With the help and guidance of Nazareth Farm staff members, we put siding on houses, worked on roofs, and learned more about the process of repairing houses for residents in this Appalachian community. We were challenged to get to know students and adults from all over the United States to form our own community. One very important way we built this community was by turning off our cell phones, and getting to know the people who were right in front of us. We played outside, hiked a mountain, held chickens, told stories about our lives, and so much more. As a community we celebrated prayer in a variety of ways throughout the week.

I was beyond honored to watch our students grow in faith, community, simplicity, and love. They found a "home" at Nazareth Farm. It was clear that their minds and hearts had been deeply impacted by all that they experienced. Service adventures like this remind me of why I became an educator: to help students open their minds and hearts to the world around them, and to empower them to be the person God is calling them to be. By the time we left it was clear that God had touched each of our students in a unique way, and that their experiences at Nazareth Farm will remain a part of their life in the future.


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
